The Greensburg resident began playing guitar around the age of 13 after listening "to many great" musicians including the Doobie Brothers, Steely Dan, Joe Pass, Miles Davis and John Coltrane, "I thought when I heard that music I wanted to learn to play it. I started picking up records to try to learn to play it."

At 19 he began teaching guitar and continued until his mid-20s, when he stopped for 15 years. He resumed teaching 20 years ago, doing so because "I loved teaching and passing on my knowledge and watching children grow up. I love to pass the techniques and the information I have to people who want to learn."

And this month, Marilan Caito will be with us to demonstrate the craft.





MAY 9, 2019 The Good Neighbor

We know a lot about Fred Rogers.

He was born March 20, 1928, in Latrobe and became internationally known for his work on public television. He received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2002, the next New Years Day was grand marshal of the Tournament of Roses Parade and a U.S. postage stamp commemorating him was dedicated March 23, 2018.



But did you know that although raised with affluence and privilege he was bullied in school? Or that he had somewhat of an inferiority complex?

Those are two of the details revealed in Max King's biography "The Good Neighbor" that Dr. John Aupperle, Munchin's longest-running presenter, will discuss this month.
